Are you thinking of working abroad in the fishing or seafood processing sectors?

This information will help you to travel abroad safely and find decent work

Migrating for work can be rewarding. Follow these tips to migrate safely and make the most of working abroad.

How can you make the most out of migration?

Be informed

Gather as much information as you can before you make the decision to migrate, including about what living and working abroad is like, the costs involved, what job you will do, the documents you need, what challenges you may experience, how to get help if you need it and how to send money home.

Obtain travel documents

All forms of labour migration carry some risks but if you migrate with a valid passport, visa and work permit you can avoid being arrested and deported in your destination country.

Check your recruitment agency or broker

Check that the recruitment agency or broker is properly licensed and has a good reputation among other migrants who have used their services.

Sign a written employment contract before you go abroad

You should sign a written employment contract with your recruitment agency or employer before you go abroad. Make sure you read it carefully and understand all the terms in the contract before you sign it.

Always keep your documents with you and make photocopies of them

Make sure you keep your documents with you and make copies of your passport, visa, work permit, employment contract, ID cards and other travel documents in case they get lost or stolen.

Be prepared for emergencies

Make a list of important contact information for friends and family prior to your departure and make sure you always have enough money with you to get home in case of an emergency.

Keep in regular contact with friends and family

Regularly communicate with your family and friends back home to let them know you are safe and build a network of trusted friends in your destination country that you can rely upon.

If you experience problems at work

If you have a conflict in the workplace, you should seek information and assistance from someone you trust. If you do not feel comfortable directly discussing the problem with your recruitment agency or employer, you can contact an NGO, trade union, your embassy or government authorities for help.

Remember: Safe migration is regular migration where workers are aware of the situation before they depart.

Fishing and seafood processing workers have labour rights in Thailand:

- You are entitled to be paid at least the legal minimum wage

 All fishing and seafood processing workers must be paid at least 313 to 336
 - All fishing and seafood processing workers must be paid at least 313 to 336 Thai baht per day as of January 2020.
- You are entitled to rest hours and any overtime work must be voluntary
 Seafood processing workers: Normal work hours are 8 hours per day x 6 days per week,
 with at least 1 hour of rest for every 5 hours of work. Fishers: 10 hours of rest must be
 provided within any 24 hour period (at least 77 hours of rest per week).
- Seafood processing workers are entitled to overtime pay
 Seafood processing workers: Overtime pay is 1.5 times the normal pay rate after 8 hours of work per day
 or 48 hours per week. In addition, overtime pay is 3 times the normal rate for overtime work on holidays.
 Fishers: Not entitled to overtime pay because of the unpredictable schedule of work.
- You are entitled to personal protective equipment and safety and health training free of charge All fishers and seafood processing workers must be provided with personal protective equipment at no charge, as well as any necessary training on occupational safety and health.
- You are entitled to take sick leave
 All fishers and seafood processing workers are entitled to take sick leave of up to 30 working days per year.
- You are entitled to paid maternity leave
 All fishers and seafood processing workers are entitled to take leave for antenatal care and childbirth of up to 98 days, including 45 paid days of leave.
- You are entitled to annual leave
 Seafood processing workers: After one year, you are allowed to take 6 days of paid annual leave.
 You are also entitled to take paid leave on 13 traditional holidays per year.
 Fishers: You are allowed to take at least 30 days of paid annual leave instead of weekly and traditional holidays.
- You are entitled to join a trade union or association

 All fishers and seafood processing workers have the right to join a trade union or association in your workplace or within your employment sector. Your employer cannot interfere with your right to join a trade union or association.
