Qualitative Assessment of Returnees Migrant Domestic Workers in Indonesia

Jakarta, Indonesia, 31 March 2015

The Global Action Programme on Migrant Domestic Workers and Their Families (GAP-MDW) organized a consultation meeting in Jakarta, Indonesia, on 31 March 2015, to provide a space for national constituents to share inputs and perspectives on proposal research on returned migrant domestic workers in Indonesia. The study aims to document through a qualitative survey the working conditions and forced labour risks faced by Indonesian domestic workers in Malaysia and their reintegration challenges.

Participants of the meeting, among them representatives of the Manpower and Transmigration Ministry (MOMT), Confederation of Indonesian Prosperity Trade Union (K-SBSI), Confederation Indonesian Trade Unions (K-SPI), Confederation of All Indonesian Trade Union (K-SPSI), Association of Employers on Migrant Workers (APJATI), Employers' Association of Indonesia (APINDO), NPC-ASEAN Triangle and ILO, highlighted the importance of better understanding of the various patterns of migration, mechanisms of recruitment, means of deception, means of coercion, risks of trafficking and forced labour faced by domestic workers throughout the recruitment process.
